SUPPORTING OUR MEDICAL RURAL BONDED STUDENTS AND DOCTORS





The Australian Government's Bonded Programs aim to provide more Australian trained doctors in areas of workforce shortage, particularly in remote, rural and regional Australia.

The Department of Health has reformed the Bonded Medical Program to provide greater support for bonded students and doctors. New arrangements to the Program commenced 1 January 2020.

Bonded doctors play an essential and valued role in helping remote and rural communities access healthcare services and NSW Rural Doctors Network (RDN) is committed to providing tailored services to bonded students and doctors, including:

- opportunities to experience living and working in a rural area, including hands-on clinical workshops and social events
- career planning advice for students with a return of service commitment with the Department
- connecting Bonded Program
 participants to vacancies that will
 meet their contractual requirements
 at the end of their training
- relocation grants (for eligible specialties) and other supports to help scholars enjoy their work when they commence.

RDN's support for bonded scholars who have achieved Fellowship and have a return of service obligation in rural NSW (RA2-5), includes:

- working to assess a doctor's individual needs and identifying strategies to support transition to general practice in rural NSW
- access to the largest database of current General Practitioner (GP) and GP Locum vacancies in NSW
- introducing doctors to the practice that best suits their professional and personal needs
- access to grants for site visits, relocation, Continuing Professional Development and RDN annual conferences for eligible doctors
- a welcome kit when commencing a new role, to connect doctors with information, services and networks
- access to the Health Workforce Scholarship Program (HWSP) for upskilling.

NSW Rural Doctors Network (RDN) is a not-for-profit and non-government organisation and is the Australian Government's designated Rural Workforce Agency (RWA) for health in NSW.

- provide financial support for further study, training and short courses
- assist in finding locum support for remote, rural and regional GPs, including through our unique and free RDN Locum Match
- deliver a wide range of health outreach services to rural towns
- support remote, rural and regional medical partners and families
- provide a range of scholarships, support and information for students studying medicine or health-related degrees in NSW.

RDN also works with:

- Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Services (ACCHSs) to support health services for Aboriginal peoples
- rural NSW Primary Health Networks (PHNs) to support remote, rural and regional GPs
- local communities, governments and rural Local Health Districts (LHDs) on medical workforce matters
- university medical faculties to promote rural medicine.
